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Competition Summary

1. Inner West Council is hosting an online Speaking 4 the Planet competition for youth in its LGA. This Information and Support Package is for those who register to join the competition. Register here: Speaking 4 the Planet Youth Week Video Competition

The package contains information about the competition category and the judging criteria; it also provides some links to articles relevant to the topic and a submission portal for entries.

- 2. Closing date for submissions is 31 March 2025.
- **3.** The topic for the competition is **Climate Change: Take Action. Inspire Action**. This topic is linked to Sustainable Development Goal #13, but as you know many of the UN's SDGS have connections with climate change.
- **4.** Competition category: Video. Maximum length is 3mins (with credits)
- **5.** There are two age groups for the competition:
 - Youth ages 12-16.
 - Senior ages 17- 24.

Young people in these age categories are eligible to participate if they live, work or study in the Inner West Local Government Area.

- 6. Each age group will have first prize nad runner up prize.
 - 1st prize in each age group includes a \$100 Westfield voucher and an S4P prize pack
 - 2nd prize in each age group includes a \$30 voucher and an S4Pprize pack.
- **7.** Participation is free for schools and students.
- **8.** Research is vital. This package contains links to useful articles and programs and talks. All participants are encouraged to do their own research.
- **9.** Participants are to produce videos that are original. They are also invited to make their work quirky.
- **10.** Judges will use the criteria in this support package to judge each submission.
- **11.** Prizes will be awarded for first and second places in both categories. All participants receive a certificate.
- 12. Please note that the videos may be placed on the S4P and Inner West Council websites and used for promotional purposes. Winning and other highly commended entries will be shared by inner West Council online to draw awareness to the themes and celebrate Youth Week. Council may display them in public places and at public events. The sponsors, Paddy Pallin and Xtreme, may also use them on their websites. Sutherland Shire Environment Centre may use them on its website and for its Annual Report. For all uses, the video creators will be credited. **By submitting your video, you acknowledge and agree to such uses of the videos.**

You are invited to prepare and deliver punchy, quirky, creative and powerful videos that seek to influence the thoughts, emotions, and actions of viewers...and to inspire more and better actions!

2. Speaking 4 the planet: Changing the world, one presentation at a time

Speaking 4 the Planet (S4P) is an arts-based approach to sustainability education.

S4P creates space and opportunities for young people to intertwine humanities and sciences, to philosophise about human actions, and to imagine a better world while standing deep in the science of the world they live in. Youth marches and student strikes are the very public faces of (climate change) protest. Speaking 4 the Planet is an equally powerful opportunity for students to speak up and advocate for a healthy future – for humans and all species.

S4P events inspire young people to think creatively, critically, independently, and courageously; they create space for students to ask challenging questions. S4P creates opportunities for youth voice not silence. The sustainability changes that the world needs won't occur by following existing dogma and practices. New thinking is required. Youthful thinking is required. Speaking 4 the Planet is founded on the belief that science provides the information we need to achieve sustainability, and the arts deliver the vehicles for transformation. Science provides the data; the arts change the world.

Use this S4P opportunity to tell the world what you think about the climate change urgency the whole world must face. Use this competition also as a time of change for yourself.

Effects of Climate Change

Hotter temperatures

As greenhouse gas concentrations rise, so does the global surface temperature. Higher temperatures increase heat-related illnesses and make working outdoors more difficult. Wildfires start more easily and spread more rapidly when conditions are hotter.

Increased drought

Climate change is changing water availability, making it scarcer in more regions. Global warming exacerbates water shortages in already water-stressed regions and is leading to an increased risk of agricultural droughts affecting crops, and ecological droughts increasing the vulnerability of ecosystems.

Not enough food

Changes in the climate and increases in extreme weather events are among the reasons behind a global rise in hunger and poor nutrition. Fisheries, crops, and livestock may be destroyed or become less productive.

Loss of species

Climate change poses risks to the survival of species on land and in the ocean. One million species are at risk of becoming extinct within the next few decades.

3. Target audiences

This competition is for young people aged 12 – 24 who live, work or play in the Inner West Local Government Area. It has two age categories:

- 12 16 years.
- 17 24 years.

You may work in small groups (max 3 people) to prepare your video but you must only submit your entry in one category.

Participation is free.

4. Competition category

There is only one category in this competition: video.

All videos must focus on the competition topic, **Climate Change: Take Action. Inspire Action**.

Your video could be:

- Speech by an individual
- Conversation
- Drama
- Dance
- Performance poetry
- Artworks explained
- Writing explained
- Song
- Documentary
- Interviews

Make it original. Make it stand out. Perhaps even a bit quirky. Make it inspire.

Give it a title.

Videos can be anything up to but not longer than 3 minutes (including credits). The focus must be the competition topic.

5. Judging criteria

Participants need to know that both content and quality of video matter. We can put that in the package. For example, an interview with a local person might have great content, but if the sound or image is poor, then the entry will score low. You want and we want good content and a good video.

Specialists in the fields of the various types of submissions will be found.

Be sure to read and understand these judging criteria

- before you start
- as you are developing your idea and video
- when you are finalising it.

It is acknowledged that not all the criteria will apply to your video. But the judges will do their best to use the criteria as they judge the diverse video submissions.

The video must be

- on topic
- within time frame (3mins).

Message and meaning

- clear in purpose, narrative and structure
- sophistication of the message and meaning
- mood enhances the narrative and message

Performance Skills

- ability to use voice, movement, timing and use of space effectively (as appropriate to the style of the piece).
- ability to realise and sustain role or character as appropriate to piece

Innovation and Flair

• originality of the piece, characters, situations and ideas

Audience Engagement

- the extent to which the audience was entertained by, or made to think about, the issue presented
- appropriateness of the performance for the audience (choice of style and dramatic conventions)
- the extent to which the video inspires action

Film Techniques

- Transitions effective editing
- Camera Work variety of camera angles effective use of camera angles
- Sound consistent level no wind distortion or feedback dialogue clear and audible throughout
- Music consistent level no wind distortion or feedback dialogue clear and audible throughout copyright: any commercial music used must be owned by the school or a film participant appropriate lyrics
- Level of music does not conflict with dialogue

Effects of Climate Change

Coral reefs

Coral reefs are created by living creatures. Warming oceans caused by climate change are putting coral reefs in danger. Coral reefs are made by very fragile colonies of organisms that build skeletons around themselves.

Coral lives together with a certain kind of colorful algae. The algae make food using sunlight – a process called photosynthesis. The algae share the food with the coral, and in turn, the coral gives the algae a safe and comfortable place to live.

The two of them get along fine, living in clean, clear, shallow waters where the Sun shines through brightly. Fish and other sea creatures love coral too, because there are lots of nooks and crannies for them to hide in.

But the algae cannot carry out photosynthesis in water that is too warm. The algae either die, or the coral spits it out. It's bad for the algae, the coral and the fish, because the coral lose their food sources and become weak and can die. This event is called coral bleaching, and it is a very serious problem in many ocean ecosystems around the world.

7. Prizes

Winners will be contacted by S4P or Inner west Council staff during Youth Week 2025 (9 to 17 April)

Winners will be announced on the S4P in April.

Inner West Council will publish the winners on its website and through its social media accounts. Winning works will be played online and at Council events and venues.

Each age group will have a first prize and a runner-up prize.

1st prize in each age group includes a \$100 Westfield voucher and an S4P prize pack 2nd prize in each age group includes a \$30 voucher and an S4P prize pack.

Once again, Paddy Pallin, a competition partner, will provide very practical items for first prizes.

Each participante will receive a certificate.



By increasing the concentration of greenhouse gases in the atmosphere, we're amplifying the planet's natural greenhouse effect and turning up the dial on global warming.

The greenhouse effect is a good thing. It warms the planet to temperatures that keep life on earth, well, livable. Without it, the world would be more like Mars: a frozen, uninhabitable place. The problem is, the voracious burning of fossil fuels for energy is artificially amping up the natural greenhouse effect. The result? An increase in <u>global warming</u> that is altering the planet's climate system. Here's a look at what the greenhouse effect is, what causes it, and how we can temper its contributions to our changing climate.


Over the past 5 years to 2021, climate change and extreme weather events have highlighted the vulnerability of human society; ecosystems and biodiversity, including freshwater and marine systems and other natural resources; industry, crops and agriculture; and urban, rural and coastal communities. Climate shifts that affect temperature and weather patterns, increased frequency and severity of extreme events, and other climate-related changes such as sea level rise are all having profound effects.

In 2021, Australia updated its nationally determined contribution to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change, affirming a target of net zero emissions by 2050.

The risks to Australia of a 3°C warmer world

This report synthesises the observed impacts of climate change on Australia and the risk to our future of the current global trajectory of greenhouse gas emissions. It focuses on the consequences of 3°C of global warming in the absence of greater mitigation strategies for four areas of importance to Australia's future: our ecosystems, food production, cities and towns, and health and wellbeing. The impacts of those changes on the lives and wellbeing of Australians are discussed in detail.
